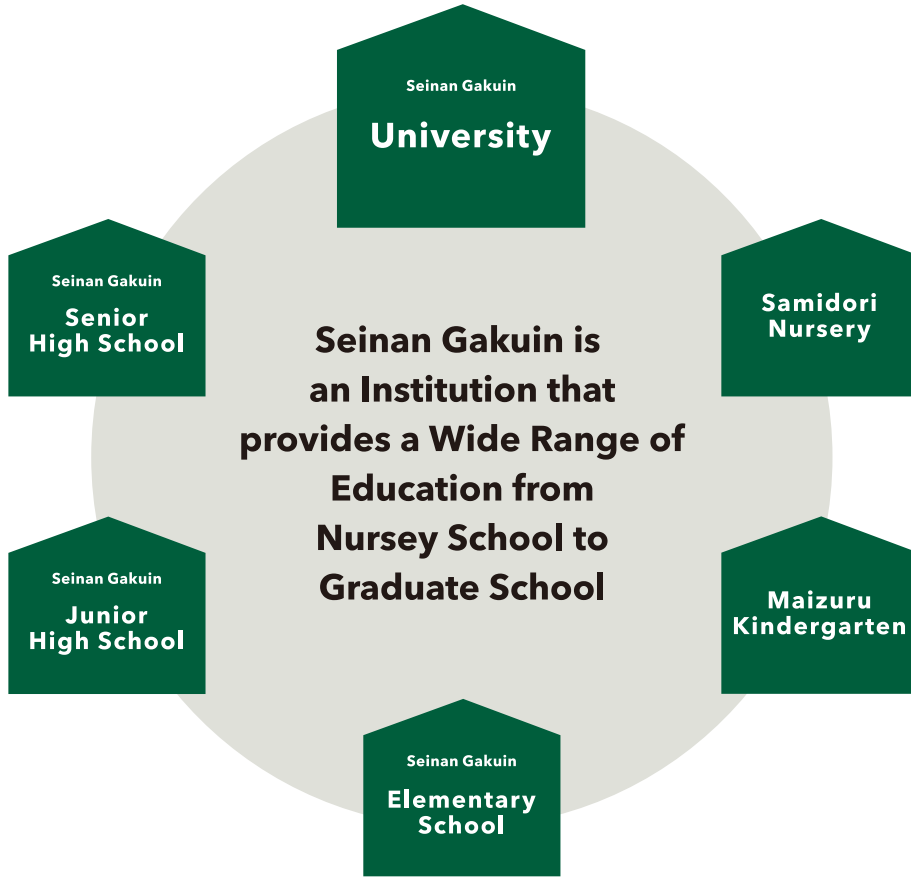

## A Leading University in Western Japan

Founded in 1916 by C.K. Dozier, a member of the International Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, Seinan Gakuin celebrated its 100th anniversary in 2016. Seinan Gakuin was one of the first Japanese academies to incorporate an English educational program into the curriculum and has employed many non-Japanese faculty members since being founded. Seinan Gakuin University (SGU) was accredited as a private Baptist university. SGU was also one of the first Japanese universities to establish international exchange programs with overseas universities and has since welcomed students from all around the world. As one of the Western Japan's pioneering universities, SGU has a reputation for providing superb foreign language education in a rich, international environment.



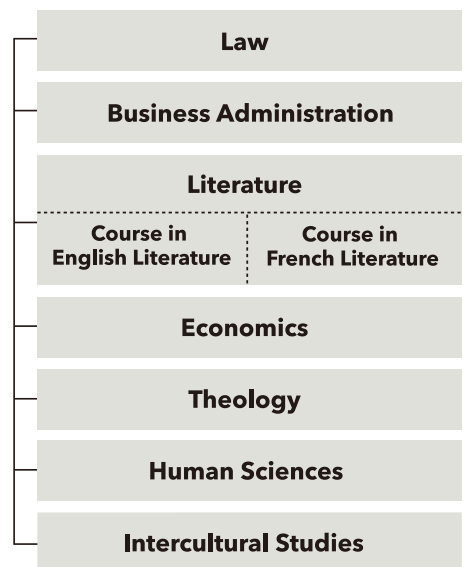

# OVERVIEW



Established in 1973, the International Division offers one or two semester programs running from August to December/January to May. The courses focus on Japanese Studies, including Japanese Language, Culture, History, Business and Politics, with all courses taught in English.

Most of the international students are on exchange programs from universities that have entered into mutual exchange agreements with SGU. These bring in approximately 150 students per year. SGU currently has the agreements with 88 institutions around the world. Each class has a diverse student population consisting of students from around the world, so that while studying Japanese, students also learn about the world.

## Courses

Students may select courses from the variety options offered by SGU. A minimum number of credits a student must register is 14 credits per semester. It is also mandatory for students to take either "Japanese Language Courses" or "Introductory Japanese" depending on their preference.



## Japanese Language Courses

There are six levels (seven in Spring) of Japanese Language courses available ranging from Beginning to Advanced. The level will be determined based on the results of placement tests. Students with no prior knowledge of Japanese can join the Beginning Japanese (3 courses / 6 classes a week / 8 credits) or Introductory Japanese (1 course / 2 classes a week / 2 credits).

Taking advantage of its long standing history of Japanese language education since 1970's, Seinan Summer Program delivers excellent linguistic training in a richly international environment to all participants every year. Session 1 (2-week) provides you with highly intensive language training, while Session 2 (4-week) provides you with additional cultural experience.

## Accommodations

Participants will stay in one of the on-campus dormitories, called International Houses. All dormitories are equipped with a kitchen, shower rooms, washers/driers, lounge and common areas where you can comfortably relax. Each room has a bed, desk, chair, toilet, and is fully air conditioned. All necessary equipment for living is available in the International Houses, ensuring a comfortable stay during the program. Japanese students also live in the International Houses and are always very helpful for international students adjusting to life in Fukuoka. We offer a relaxed environment for both study and intercultural exchange.

## Meals

There are shared kitchens in each dormitory, so participants can cook themselves. Just under ten minutes on foot, you can go to supermarkets and get groceries. There are also many restaurants around the campus and they offer a wide range of cuisines from many countries. Students can also have meals at on-campus cafeterias at reasonable prices.

## Resources

Participants will have access to the library, the language laboratory, and free wifi.

## Welcome Services

Pick-up service is available by Seinan Gakuin University students, and they will take you to the dormitory.

# OVERVIEW

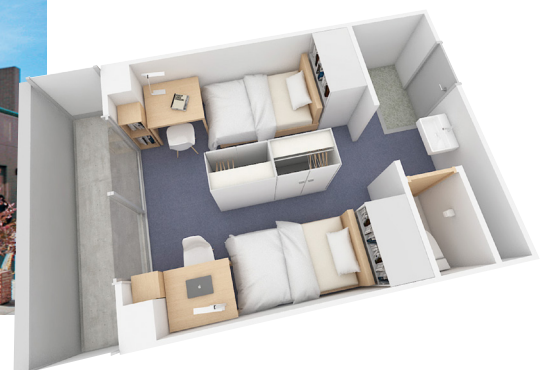

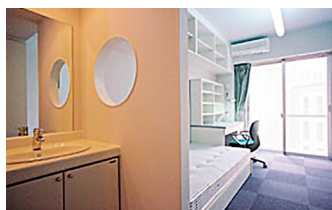

Following Tokyo and Osaka, Fukuoka is a popular study destination for international students from around the world. Fukuoka City is engaged in a variety of exchanges not only with Asia, but indeed with the world. It enjoys sister-city relationships with Oakland (USA), Bordeaux (France), Auckland (New Zealand), Guangzhou (China), Ipoh (Malaysia) and Pusan (Korea) among others. 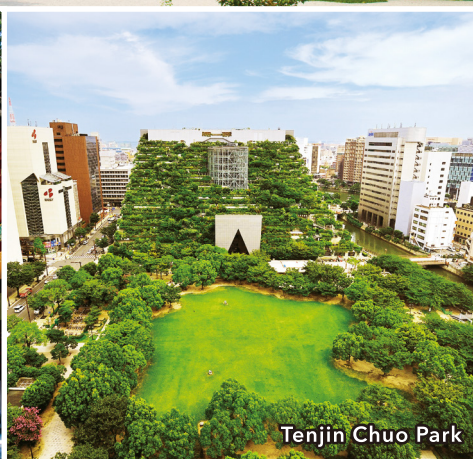
